### **Positive Behaviour for Learning**

Positive Behaviour for Learning (PBL) is Alex Park's whole-school behaviour support program, which provides students, staff and families with clear expectations for behaviour and common, positive language for discussing behaviour. The three values of PBL at Alex Park are:









These values are reinforced through direct teaching, the language used by all staff throughout the school, and visual posters displayed throughout the school. We recognise positive behaviour, effort and achievement through our Deadlys achievement system and recognition at assemblies, and we manage behaviour through the school discipline system, which includes behaviour contracts.

## **APCS** is an Allergy Aware School

As you may be aware, there are students in our school who have an allergy to certain types of food. In order to help ensure that all our students are safe, we ask you to please not send your child with foods, which contain common allergens such as nuts, eggs, or fish. This includes food items such as peanut butter and Nutella.

They will explore the following big ideas:  • The number system extends infinitely to very large and very small numbers (whole numbers, place value, ordering and representing numbers, patterns)  • Addition and subtraction problems can be solved by using a variety of strategies (problem-solving, using place value to add and subtract, recognising equality)  • What needs to be measured determines the unit of measurement (using appropriate units to measure and record length and time, and comparing features of 2D shapes)  • Fractions represent multiple ideas and can be represented in different ways (creating, naming and recognising fractions)  • Questions can be asked and answered by collecting and interpreting data (collecting, organising and interpreting data in tables and simple graphs)		
HSIE (Human Society and It's Environment)	Places are Similar and Different	Students will examine the natural and human features of Australia's places and environments. They will use the picture book <i>My Place</i> as a starting point to explore changing land uses, settlement patterns and demographic characteristics of places in Australia. They will use atlases and digital tools to undertake geographical inquiry and develop skills in analysing and evaluation information.		
Creative Arts	Visual Arts	Students will use a variety of art materials to create artworks linked to their study of oceans and polar environments in English. They will interpret their own and others' artwork, including the work of artist Ted Harrison.		
	Music	This term Stage 2 will be learning about concepts of music with a particular focus on texture and tone colour. They will be exploring these concepts through experimenting with tuned and untuned percussion instruments and beginning to use formal notation to record their own simple compositions. This term our instrument focus will be using untuned percussion instruments.		

PDHPE	Safety and Wellbeing, and "Got It" Second Step	Students will investigate safe and unsafe features of specific environments, including safety in the sun and when swimming. In <i>Second Step</i> lessons, they will continue to develop their social skills and strategies for positive interactions with others.
	Games and sports.	Students will participate in a range of activities to improve physical fitness. Additionally, they will participate in their chosen sport on Friday mornings.
