#### APCS REDEVELOPMENT – MAY UPDATE Investing in our schools

The NSW Government is investing \$6 billion over the next four years to deliver more than 170 new and upgraded schools to support communities across NSW. In addition, a record \$1.3 billion is being spent on school maintenance over four years. This is the largest investment in public education infrastructure in the history of NSW.

#### Alexandria Park Community School project

Alexandria Park Community School is being redeveloped to cater for increasing student enrolments from Kindergarten to Year 12. The redevelopment project will deliver a new school which can accommodate 1,000 primary school students and up to 1,200 high school students.

The new school is being constructed in two phases and includes:

- 104 new permanent innovative learning spaces
- 6 special education learning spaces
- 12 special program rooms (high school) for subjects including visual and performing arts, science and metal and woodwork
- Other new facilities including a library, hall, gymnasium, administration areas and multiple sports courts and play spaces.

So, the school can remain open during construction, classes are being conducted in two pop-up schools, one for K-6 and the other for 7-12 students.

#### **Progress summary**

The Contractor has protected and stored off site, a series of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Island artworks from the school's buildings including the Jim Simon (2003) painting, the Gadigal Map and the Dot painting. The design team is reviewing opportunities for re-installation of these artworks into the new school buildings.



Site establishment has been carried out and temporary fencing and hoarding erected to safely separate the construction site from the school grounds. Site sheds and amenities have been installed and site vehicle access has been established.

Upcoming works Demolition and site remediation works for

phase one of the project will continue, including (as previously notified) the removal of known hazardous materials from the site. There will be unavoidable noise associated with the demolition and construction, but the contractor is working to



minimise impacts wherever possible. All work on site is being carried out in strict accordance with approved environmental management plans, applicable legislation, regulations, policies and guidelines to ensure the health and safety of the school and local community. Sprinklers are being used on site to contain dust and noise and air quality monitoring is being carried out.

#### **Construction working hours**

Normal working hours are from 7.00am to 6.00pm Monday to Friday and 7.30am to 3.30pm on Saturdays. No work will take place on Sundays or public holidays.

#### CELEBRATING STUDENT SUCCESS

Congratulations to Tate and Jarvis, Taekwondo brothers and champions. Tate brought home gold on the in the 6th Annual Taekwondo Festival, it is the first time he has won gold. Jarvis too receiving medals. I asked the boys to tell our community about the sport of Taekwondo. Here is their story:

Taekwondo comes from Korea. Tae meaning 'foot'. Kwon meaning 'fist'. Do meaning 'way of' Taekwondo means 'the way of the hand and fist'. The name Taekwondo has only been used since 1955 while the martial arts roots began 2,300 years ago in Korea.

Our academy is called the Australian Martial Arts Academy and has been around for 38yrs in Marrickville. Grand Master Ridvan grew up in Redfern and started boxing at the PCYC in Redfern at the age of 10. Through his work with Taekwondo GM Ridvan been inducted into the World Taekwondo Hall of Fame.

#### Tate;

I have been doing Taekwondo since I was 3, so for 8 years now. I enjoy teaching the 3-5yr olds and passing on the techniques that I have learned. I can't wait to get a red instructor shirt and be a part of the teaching team.

I love working with the weapons best and prefer the Bo Staff the most. My goals are to become a Grand Master and have a 9th Dan Black Belt.

I am currently working towards my 3rd Dan.

#### Jarvis;

I have been doing Taekwondo since I was 2 ½, I grew up on the mats watching my brother. I have been going for 6yrs.

I love the tricking and kicking side of Taekwondo, I am currently working on a round off back flip.

I love competing in competitions and really enjoy showing off my skills in extreme weapons.

I like the pressure of the gradings as I get to challenge myself.

My goals are to go on and be the best in the world with the Karmas and to go on and get my 9th Dan. I am currently working towards my 2nd Dan.

We both currently attend 5 days a week, attending different classes. Tricking, leadership classes, Masters Class, junior Xtreme team, black belt class along with other normal classes for our age group. Martial arts has helped us both to learn to focus, it provides us with opportunities to grow and challenge ourselves.

#### HSC MINIMUM STANDARDS

From 2020, students in NSW will need to demonstrate a minimum standard of literacy and numeracy to receive their Higher School Certificate (HSC).

The minimum standard for the HSC 2020 is linked to NAPLAN 2017 results. Students who received a band 8 or higher in their Year 9 Reading, Writing and Numeracy NAPLAN tests have already met the standard and will not need to sit the minimum standard online tests.

Students will need to sit the online tests in the areas in which they did NOT score band 8 or higher.



The HSC minimum standard online tests are each 45 minutes long, and include:

- a multiple choice test for reading;
- a multiple choice test for numeracy; and
- a test for writing (around 500 words) based on a written or visual prompt.

These tests are based around the Australian Core Skills Framework and the minimum standard is set at level 3. This means that students who demonstrate the standard have the basic functional skills used in everyday life, for work and further study.

Students have two opportunities each year to sit these online tests, from Year 10 until Year 12. Students will also be able to complete the tests for up to five years after starting HSC.

Students will be supported by the school to meet the minimum standard. Please contact Ms Ryan the Head Teacher of English if you would like more information.

#### CANTEEN

Our school canteen is amazing and provides fresh, healthy, fun, tasty foods and snacks for students and staff.

Lunch can be ordered in person at the counter before school, or for your convenience via the flexischools app or website: https://www.flexischools.com.au/

Simply register, select 'Alexandria Park Community School' and your child's year and name, and the menu options will be displayed for either primary or high school canteen.

Currently the canteen is offering their Winter menu, with a selection of sandwiches, wraps, healthy snacks and drinks as well as hot daily specials including meatball sub, spaghetti Bolognese, and beef sliders.

The servings are portion controlled and items and meal portions vary between primary and high school.

Senior students are not permitted to the leave the school grounds and go to local shops to buy food. No student is the leave the school grounds without permission. Take a look at some of the food from our canteen this week.

#### PRIMARY SCHOOL

#### DEPUTY PRINCIPAL REPORT

As the weather is becoming cooler all Primary students should be wearing their winter uniforms. Our winter uniform consists of a blue school jacket or jumper, red school shirt and navy pants. Students are still expected to wear a school hat when they are playing in any area other than the COLA. They must bring a hat on sport days. Our school expectations are 'Be a Learner, Be Respectful and Be safe'.

Some students in Stage 3 are allowed to bring devices to school to support their learning. These devices are only allowed to be used during class time. If students bring mobile phones to school (to use before or after school for parent contact) they must be stored in a safe place during the school day and are not to be used on the playground.

I would like to remind all parents, carers and students that supervision of primary students commences at 8:40AM. If students arrive at school before this time, parents/carers need to remain with their child/ren until this time. Our school day finishes at 3:00PM. If students are playing on the equipment after school, they need to be supervised otherwise students are expected to make their way home promptly as per their parent/carer arrangements.

One of our PBL targeted areas for this term is focusing on 'keeping the playground clean'. Students have time to eat their food at lunch and afternoon tea in their classrooms. They can purchase snacks form the canteen at lunch. If students are eating on the playground, they must be sitting down, and all rubbish needs to go in the bin. Having a sense of pride in our playground is important for our school community.

At the end of Week 6 Miss Wilson be commencing maternity leave. We will miss her expertise in leadership and outstanding teaching practice. We have recruited a permanent teacher to replace Miss Wilson. Ms Lisa Akkoumi will begin her permanent appointment at the beginning of Term 3. Ms Martha Austin will be the Stage 1 Assistant Principal for the remainder of the year. Ms Austin currently teaches Year 1 and has been working at APCS over the past 11 years.

I would like to thank Ms Young as she has culled and collated our 'Big Book' resources to share with Wagga Wagga Public School. We have sent these books through the post this week and they should arrive shortly. I know the school and students were very grateful for the donation.

#### STAGE 1(YEARS 1&2) NEWS

Year 1 and Year 2 classes have lots of exciting things happening this term. Our science and geography integrated unit for the term 'Weather and the amazing earth around us' involves exploring how we use the earth's resources sustainably. Students are looking at the impact we have on our natural environment and how we can make a difference in our everyday life.

Students have also been enjoying learning about factual texts and writing about weather events they have researched. Mrs McLaurin, our English as an additional language or dialect (EAL/D) teacher, has been co-teaching writing with Year 1 and 2 teachers once a week. This has been a great opportunity for



teachers to work with each other and to plan some effective and engaging lessons. Additionally, Miss Ozdirik, the learning and support



teacher (LAST), has been working in Stage 1 classes to support our writing program as well as running the "Minilit" intensive reading program and Lego social skills group for selected students.

#### STAGE 2 (YEARS 3&4) NEWS

On the 7th of May, Stage Two went on an excursion to Carriage works to look at "The National 2019 exhibition" featuring a number of artists including Australia's Tony Albert. The students saw artworks from many Australian artists.



This installation by Nat Thomas recreates a scene from a Hollywood film. Students were invited to lie down on the platform and simulate hanging and falling from a tall building.



Stage 2 then went inside a building at Carriage works, which had been filled with 300 tonnes of soil. They raked, dampened, and fertilised it.

It was all part of 'Absorption', the latest installation from Sydney-based organisation Kaldor Public Art Projects.

Did you know that there are 4-6 billion living organisms in just two teaspoons of soil?

Our students got to rake and fertilise the soil with crushed up cuttle fish, which adds calcium. Classes have taken some back to school and are growing carrots out of this very healthy soil!



#### STAGE 3 (YEARS 5&6) NEWS




chose the particular right that they believed to be most important and created a protest-type poster demanding action.

**Tertiary Qualification**: Bachelor of Science (Mathematics Major) / Bachelor of Education (with Honours) from University of New South Wales – completed 2008-2012

**Teaching Experience**: I began casual teaching in Term 4 2012 at Randwick Girls' High School and Sydney Girls' High School which lead to a temporary full-time role at Randwick Girls' High School that lasted from the beginning of 2013 through to the end of Term 1 2014. I was lucky to find a permanent placement at Gundagai High School where I spent 5 years in the beautiful Riverina. I decided to move back to Sydney, to be with my partner and family again and was lucky (once again) to find a position at Alex Park. I have taught Mathematics at most high school levels from

Year 7 to Year 12 and look forward to the challenge of taking Mathematics Extension 2 classes in the future. My eyes were opened to other areas of teaching by taking a Year 9 Science class (in 2013) for a year and would consider teaching out of my chosen area again somewhere down the line.

**Teaching Style:** I like to support every student to apply themselves and do their best. I have played basketball extensively in the past and am looking to get back in to playing more socially. #### EASTER SHOW DISPLAY 2019

well as encouraging teamwork and public speaking. The aim of the Schools District Exhibits is to showcase the diversity of our rural pursuits through the collaboration of various faculties including; Agriculture, Design and Technology, Art and Woodwork.



Our theme captivated the importance of the Native Bee "Gunini" to the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples and to Australian Agriculture. The NSW minister for Agriculture

#### Sydney Royal Easter Show 2019 - Meat Birds Competition

APCS has such an array of opportunities for its students, one of these opportunities is through Vocational Education Training for the qualification, Certificate 1 in Agrifood Operations. This is a nationally recognised certificate and the students work towards this over one year.

As part of the Year 10 Agrifood course one of the requirements is to 'Support intensive livestock'. The students become competent in this unit through the husbandry and production recording of Broiler chickens.

The broiler chickens are also then entered in the Sydney Royal Show to compete against other schools across the state. The students gain skills through feeding and watering, cleaning the

bedding, weighing and monitoring that the chickens are healthy throughout the 6 week period they are at the school.

This year the students received 5th Place with a pair of Female broilers- carcase and 8th place with a pair of female broilers-live.

The students also visited the show allowing them to experience and gain further knowledge on a range of Agricultural enterprises.

#### Young Judges at the Royal

A Young Judges training program has been implemented at APCS in which senior students who have entered Young Judges competitions, now support younger students to compete at the Sydney Royal Easter Show. Several students have become State and National Champions in these competitions and now act as student leaders to mentor younger students in the program.

### HUMAN SOCIETY IN ITS ENVIRONMENT (HSIE) NEWS

Term 2 is an assessment term and students have been writing essays on land rights in Year 10, creating propaganda posters in Year 9 and developing their source analysis skills in Years 7 and 8.

Year 7 are studying Ancient China whilst Year 8 are looking at Aboriginal and Indigenous people in the colonisation and contact history unit. Year 9 are studying World War One and World War Two Year 10 are studying The Holocaust and looking at survivors' stories. In commerce students have been looking at workplaces and the legal system. Year 12 studying Aboriginal Studies have submitted their major works which will be on exhibition later in the term.

At APCS each Tuesday students participate in Project based learning. In 2019 HSIE is running the BIG HISTORY PROJECT. The BHP It is a multi-disciplinary approach to knowledge for learners around the world. Co-founded by Bill Gates and Professor David Christian and a host of experts. The course spans 13.8 billion years. It weaves insights from many disciplines to form a single story that helps us better understand people, civilizations, and

how we are connected to everything around us. Students in Year 10 have been inventing a species that could live on earth in the future.

#### MATHEMATICS

All classes are working well in Mathematics this term. Students are preparing for various assessments coming up in the next few weeks. This is Year 10 Mathematics 5.3 working on presenting and analysing data displays. This knowledge will be used in their Sustainability in Statistics project next semester.

#### SCIENCE - Year 11 Biology

This term the Year 11 Biology students have had scalpel in hand dissecting and relating the scientific concepts to living things. A fish was dissected allowing the students to investigate the gas exchange via gills, as well as the structure of the organs and how the structure improves the efficiency of its function. A sheep heart was dissected to assist the students understanding of the transport systems used within animals, in particular the transport of blood in the **cardiovascular system**.












#### Year 12 Chemistry

#### IST - Year 7-10 Digital Technologies

The Year 7 and 8 Digital technology classes have been using Adobe Photoshop to learn digital editing techniques, aligned with their English, HSIE and Visual Arts subjects. There have been some really great results with creating self-portraits in Photoshop. They also spent a lesson tearing apart an old laptop and some students arranged all the parts into a piece of art!



Year 9 have just completed their first major project this year, so congratulations are in order. They have been creating a step by step guide on how to disassemble desktop computers and laptops. Using tools, they have successfully opened and pulled apart all the hardware and identified all the major components required for a computer to function.



Year 10 also completed their major coding project. In class Year 10 have been individually coding Sphero robots. They had to design a program to either play a game with Sphero or use Sphero to solve a problem. We have had games ranging from an interactive Magic 8 ball to guessing games. We also had a romantic robot that spins around you and your partner and alarm clocks that you need to shake to turn off.

#### AGRICULTURE - Bush Tucker Garden

The Agriculture students have been busy designing and constructing a new garden beds at APCS. The school was supported by Indigigrow who supplied the school with the garden beds, soil and native bush food seedlings. It was a great activity which required a great deal of manual labour, from screwing the beds together to shovelling the soil and transporting it with wheel borrows. The students learnt about the native plants from the Indigigrow Horticulturalist, and an insight into a landscaper gardens career.

The students will maintain the garden area and hope to harvest the Native produce.

It was also great to have the Preliminary Aboriginal Studies students involved in the planting of the seedlings. This will be an important initiative for them to discuss in the HSC course as they look at initiatives to maintain Aboriginal culture.
