We would like to acknowledge and pay respect to the **Cadigal** people of the **Eora** nation, the traditional owners of the land on which we teach and learn. In **Gomberee**, the language of the **Cadigal** people, the word **Yarramundi** (yarra'-mu-ndi) means flowing mouth which is an analogy for story telling or a story teller. We name our newsletter **Yarramundi** as it tells the stories of Alex Park as we progress through each school year.



Yarramundi also means amphitheatre or a place where stories are told. This is why we have named the gathering space in the primary playground **Yarramundi**.

The students will set up a box for donations.



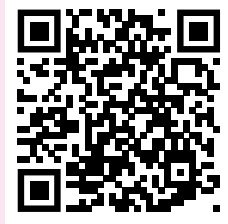


Suggested items for donation are:

- the end of year event schedule, including presentation day.



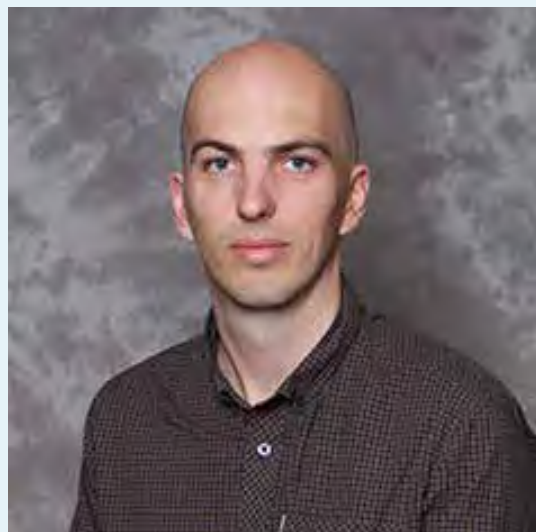
We also begin to welcome our new Kindergarten students for 2023 with their Orientation days.

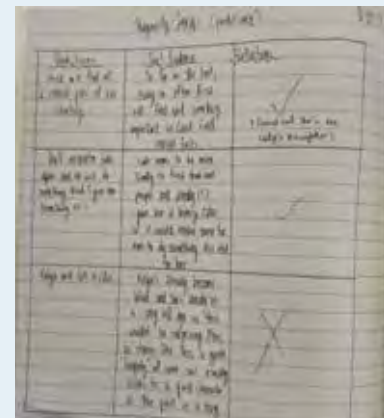
Each week they read text selections and completed activities that develop 'Super Six' comprehension strategies.

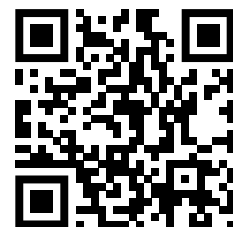


Ms Campisi is always so impressed at how innately musical the students are at Alex Park and how quickly they are able to learn new musical skills.

Year 7 News

In Term 2 this year, 7A, 7L, 7E and 7P each made an artwork mural! With the help of Auntie Jeanie and Uncle Desi, 7A, 7L, 7E and 7P made their way out to Alexandria Park to collect materials to create this mural.



There were plenty of materials that were collected on this land, such as different sized sticks, flowers, and beautiful leaves that had a range of colours like purple, pink and yellow. In total, over 100 items were collected in preparation for this artwork.



After all the different materials were collected, all students from 7E and 7P had come to the final decision to create the artwork based on a Goanna, the significant totem of the Cadigal people.



A totem is an animal that is a part of the land that first nations people feel connected to within their culture, community and family. Having a totem also comes with a responsibility to protect and conserve that totem.

All students from 7A and 7L had collectively decided to create their class artwork based on the environmental surroundings of Alex Park and the harmony shared within the school.



The materials and inspiration were drawn from trees grown in Alexandria Park, such as the Port Jackson Fig Tree, River Red Gum Tree, Moreton Bay Fig and American Cottonwood.

According to the City of Sydney's tree archives, some of the trees in Alexandria Park were planted in 1890, making them 132 years old.

All students from both classes gathered into different groups during their English and Geography lessons to work on their class artworks.

Students were assigned into groups that worked through sorting, designing, arranging, researching the totem and environment of Alexandria Park, and writing of the Newsletter article.

The different groups split off to contribute to the creation of the Goanna artwork and Alexandria Park design artwork.

These terrific artworks will be displayed within the High School building.

All students thoroughly enjoyed learning about the environmental and cultural history of Alexandria with the great help of Aunty Jeannie and Uncle Desi!

English News

Year 8

Students will be working hard to improve their inferential reading skills and will also get opportunities to create their own poetry. We can't wait to see if we have the next William Wordsworth in our midst.

Year 9

Get your popcorn ready Year 9, because it's goodbye to Mrs Peregrine and those peculiar children and hello to film studies. Students will analyse how film techniques engage the viewer as well as manipulate the audience's perspective. An understanding of codes and conventions of film are utilised as a source of power in meaning making. In other words, you're delving deep, deep into cinema.

Year 10

This Term Year 10 will need to dig deep and focus on acquiring the skills that will set them up for Preliminary English. This is a fantastic opportunity to test their skills and extend themselves to see if they have what it takes to succeed in the English course they have elected for next year.

For students preparing themselves for English Advanced, a good measure is if you enjoy literature from the Western Canon, if you love writing extended responses, if you appreciate exploring how meaning is created and giving evidence to support it, you finish reading every single text set in class (including novels) and if you complete every single class task and submit every assessment task on time. If you answer yes to all of these, then English Advanced is for you. If not, and you have elected Advanced for next year then this Term is your chance to buckle down and make sure that everything is a yes by then end of the Term. If not, perhaps another level of English might suit you better.



Highest ATAR achieved by a person studying English Advanced in 2021, 99.95 – 99.95 is the highest rank you can achieve.

If you love all of the above and want even more depth, even more challenge, and you always submit everything in English, even optional tasks, and complete them to a high standard, then might we suggest you also elect English Extension 1. **Highest ATAR achieved by a person studying English Extension 1 in 2021, 99.5 – 99.5 is the highest rank you can achieve.**

If you are preparing yourself for English Standard, a good measure is that, like in Advanced, you love writing extended responses, you appreciate exploring meaning and giving evidence to support your assertions, you finish reading every text set in class (including novels), you complete your class work and assessment tasks on time BUT you prefer more contemporary texts. If this is you and you have elected English Standard, perfect. If you have elected English Standard and this sounds nothing like you, then you have this term to put your nose to the grindstone and make it you. If not, then perhaps you might be better suited to another level of English. **Highest ATAR achieved by a person studying English Standard in 2021, 99.65.**

If you are preparing yourself for English Studies a good measure is that you prefer shorter texts, you enjoy a variety of texts, and focusing on themes to explore texts is more interesting for you. English Studies has a variety of modules to choose from ranging from Playing the Game, which focuses on texts for and about sport, to The Big Screen which is all about exploring texts to do with film. If you have elected this subject and this sounds like something you would enjoy, then fabulous, you're exactly where you need to be. **Highest ATAR achieved by a person studying English Studies in 2021, 84.20.**

If you are preparing yourself for English EAL/D then this means you are a student who has been educated overseas or in an Australian educational institution with English as the language of instruction for five years or less prior to commencing the Year 11 course. This includes Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students from remote Indigenous communities where Standard Australian English is not the language of instruction. If you are eligible for this course then it is usually the best course for you. **Highest ATAR achieved by a person studying English EAL/D in 2021, 99.90.**

Year 11

Year 11 is no longer Year 11, they're big kids now and are officially in their HSC course. All classes are now studying the Common Module, Texts and Human Experiences. English Standard are studying an Australian novel, Past the Shallows, and English Advanced are studying the iconic Nineteen Eighty-Four. Big Brother is watching you and so is Mrs Ryan, to make sure you get a fantastic start to your HSC course and stay on top of your tasks.

English Extension 1 students are exploring Literary Worlds and Extension 2 students are preparing for their Major Project Proposals by way of viva voce. It would be beneficial for our HSC of 2023 cohort to read the Year 10 information above on English subjects to ensure they are in the course that best suits them.

An American story turned into a musical for the ages.



Hamilton was first performed in 2015 on Broadway and has since become a worldwide sensation. It was directed by Thomas Kail and the playwright, composer and lyricist are all Lin-Manuel Miranda who also played the leading role of Alexander Hamilton. Talk about well-rounded. This review is on the performance that is available for viewing on Disney+ that features the original casting. Since its premiere, Hamilton has been nominated for many awards and has won 11 Tonys. Safe to say, Hamilton lives up to its reputation.

Personally, the standouts were Alexander Hamilton, Eliza Hamilton and King George. Lin-Manuel Miranda is absolutely outstanding and his ability to hold the audience is truly breathtaking.



One of the greatest moments in the whole musical was Eliza's scream towards the end after she suffers a tragic loss. That scream single-handedly expressed every emotion she was feeling. All the rage, anger, frustration, despair and hopelessness came out in that one moment and made the world go quiet. King George is simply hilarious. It is hard to portray that kind of humour without it coming off as cringy or trying too hard but this part was played perfectly. Some of my favourite moments were when he would come out on stage and you just knew that he was going to make you laugh. Overall, the casting and acting were done next to perfectly. I especially like how not one person carried the play, it felt like real teamwork as they all came together to put on an amazing production.

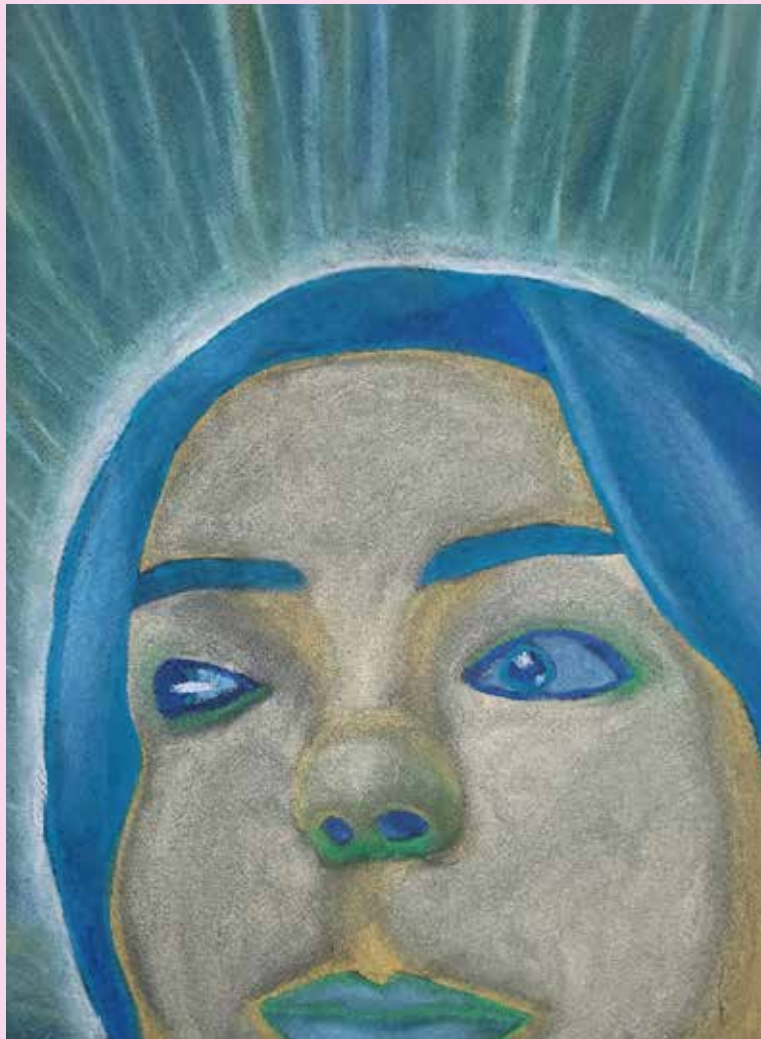

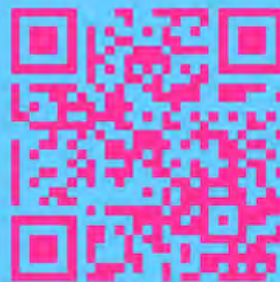

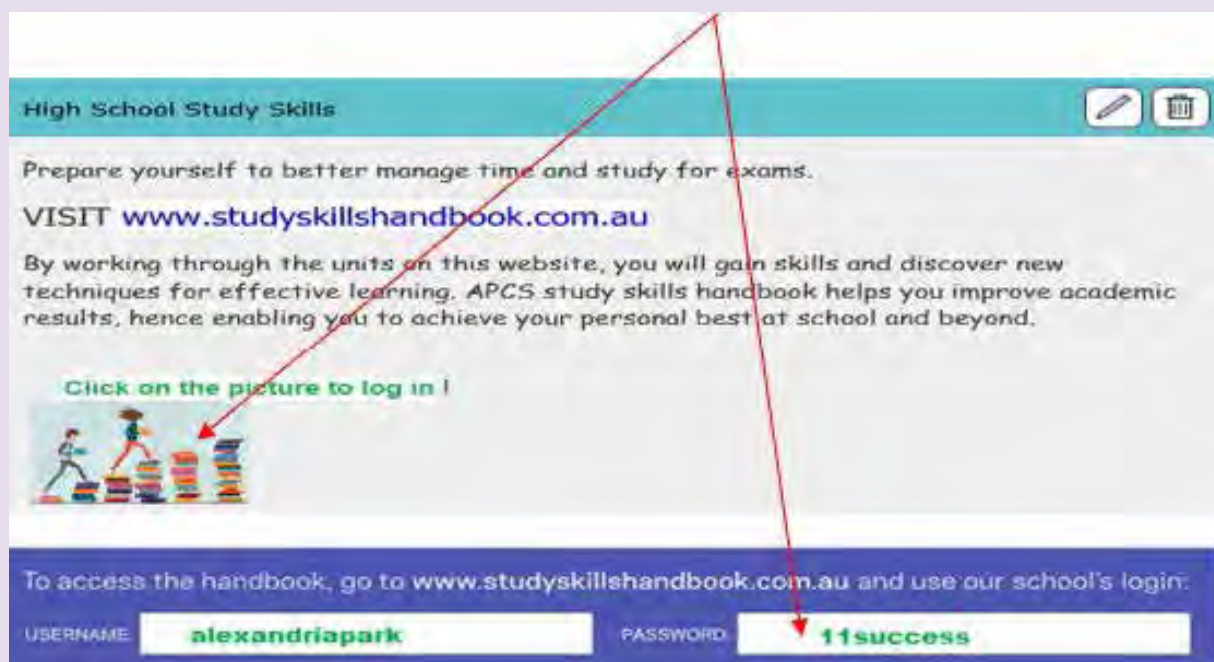
