

**Alexandria Park Community School is on Cadigal Land**. We would like to acknowledge and pay respect to the **Cadigal** people of the **Eora** nation, the traditional owners of the land on which we teach and learn. We acknowledge their living culture and their unique role in the life of this region. We would also like to pay respect to elders past, present, and emerging.

In **Gomberee**, the language of the **Cadigal** people, the word **Yarramundi** (yarra'-mu-ndi) means flowing mouth which is an analogy for story telling or a story teller. We name our newsletter **Yarramundi** as it tells the stories of Alex Park as we progress through each school year.



**Yarramundi** also means amphitheater or a place where stories are told. This is why we have named the gathering space in the primary playground **Yarramundi**.

# Principal's Report as Report




I would like to welcome all of our families back to Term 3. This week is Education Week and we are recognising 175 years since the establishment of Public Schools in NSW. Alexandria Park Community School is a proud and inclusive community and we continually strive for success in all that we do. Most recently, this has been evidenced in our achievements in basketball in both our Primary and High Schools. We are opening our Primary classrooms this Thursday and I hope to see many families attend, as I know our students will be proud to share their work.

Our Year 12 students will begin their Trial HSC exams next Wednesday. They will be attending regular classes on Monday and Tuesday. The examination timetable has been finalised and distributed to students, along with information regarding appropriate exam procedures and protocols. It is important that students become familiar with the timetable and continue their preparation for these exams to ensure they are feeling confident.

At our School Development Day our staff participated in workshops listening to feedback from our Primary and High School students about our school. Last Term over 200 students were interviewed across K-12 promoting the importance of student voice. During these interviews our students discussed the strengths and areas of improvement relating to our well-being programs. Our teachers and executive teams will analyse this information to continue to support students learning and well-being as well as their academic success.



# Compulsory school attendance

# Information for parents

Education for your child is important and regular attendance at school is essential for your child to achieve their educational best and increase their career and life options. NSW public schools work in partnership with parents to encourage and support regular attendance of children and young people. When your child attends school every day, learning becomes easier and your child will build and maintain friendships with other children.

# What are my Legal responsibilities?

Education in New South Wales is compulsory for all children between the ages of six years and below the minimum school leaving age of 17 years. The Education Act 1990 requires that parents ensure their children of compulsory school age are enrolled at, and regularly attend school, or, are registered with the NSW Education and Standards Authority for home schooling.

Once enrolled, children are required to attend school each day it is open for students.

# The Importance of arriving on time

Arriving at school and class on time:

- Ensures that students do not miss out on important learning activities scheduled early in the day
- Helps students learn the importance of punctuality and routine
- Give students time to greet their friends before class
- Reduces classroom disruption

Lateness is recorded as a partial absence and must be explained by parents.

# What if my child has to be away from school?

On occasion, your child may need to be absent from school. Justified reasons for student absences may

- being sick, or having an infectious disease
- having an unavoidable medical appointment
- being required to attend a recognised religious holiday
- exceptional or urgent family circumstance (e.g. attending a funeral)

Following an absence from school you must ensure that within 7 days you provide your child's school with a verbal or written explanation for the absence. However, if the school has not received an explanation from you within 2 days, the school may contact you to discuss the absence.

Principals may decline to accept an explanation that you have provided if they do not believe the absence is in the best interest of your child. In these circumstances your child's absence would be recorded as unjustified. When this happens the principal will discuss their decision with you and the reasons why.

Principals may request medical certificates or other documentation when frequent or long term absences are explained as being due to illness. Principals may also seek parental permission to speak with medical specialists to obtain information to collaboratively develop a health care plan to support your child. If the request is denied, the principal can record the absences as unjustified.

### **Travel**

Families are encouraged to travel during school holidays. If travel during school term is necessary, discuss this with your child's school principal. An Application for Extended Leave may need to be completed. Absences relating to travel will be marked as leave on the roll and therefore contribute to your child's total absences for the year.

In some circumstances students may be eligible to enrol in distance education for travel periods over 50 school days. This should be discussed with your child's school principal.

# My child won't go to school what should I do?

You should contact the principal as soon as possible to discuss the issue and ask for help. Strategies to help improve attendance may include a referral to the school's learning and support team or linking your child with appropriate support networks. The principal may seek further support from the Home School Liaison Program to develop an Attendance Improvement Plan.

# What might happen if my child continues to have unacceptable absences?

It is important to understand that the Department of Education may be required to take further action where children of compulsory school age have recurring numbers of unexplained or unjustified absences from school.

Some of the following actions may be undertaken:

• Compulsory Schooling Conferences

You may be asked, along with your child, to attend a Compulsory Schooling Conference. The conference will help to identify the supports your child may need to have in place so they attend school regularly. The school, parents and agencies will work together to develop an agreed plan (known as Undertakings) to support your child's attendance at school.

• Application to the Children's Court – Compulsory Schooling Order

If your child's attendance at school remains unsatisfactory the Department may apply to the Children's Court for a Compulsory Schooling Order. The Children's Court magistrate may order a Compulsory Schooling Conference to be convened.

• Prosecution in the Local Court

School and Department staff remain committed to working in partnership with you to address the issues which are preventing your child's full participation at school. In circumstances where a breach of compulsory schooling orders occurs further action may be taken against a parent in the Local Court. The result of court action can be the imposition of a community service order or a fine.

# What age can my child leave school?

All New South Wales students must complete Year 10 or its equivalent. After Year 10, and up until they reach 17 years of age, there are a range of flexible options for students to complete their schooling.

# **Working in Partnership**

The NSW Department of Education recognises that working collaboratively with students and their families is the best way to support the regular attendance of students at school.

We look forward to working in partnership with you to support your child to fulfil their life opportunities.








# **Road Safety and Traffic**

Please refrain from parking/stopping in driveways and apartment block car parks. These are for residents and their visitors only.


Local businesses have nominated parking spots for their employees and customers, please respect this by not parking in their allocated spaces and parking bays.

At the end of Term 2, Stage 1 took part in Alex Park's amazing NAIDOC Week celebrations.









# News from the Primary Music Hub

- 2. Students gather support/donations from their friends and family; and
- 3. Students 'busk' or perform their rendition to their friends, family, school.

Busking For Change is a fun and educational activity that acknowledges and promotes the rich diversity of Indigenous languages and cultures while raising funds to help create more books in languages that Aboriginal and Torres Strait islander children speak at home.

Alex Park Primary will be having our big singalong performance on Wednesday 8th September in Week 8 on Indigenous Literacy Day. Stay tuned for more details about this but in the meantime let's start fundraising.

# The Premier's Reading Challenge for 2023 has begun!

It is not a competition but a challenge to each student to read, to read more and to read more widely.

The Premier's Reading Challenge (PRC) is open to all NSW students in Kindergarten to Year 10, in government, independent, Catholic and home schools.



# 2023 Challenge dates

Students can include any books read from the end of the 2022 challenge on their 2023 reading record. Key dates for the 2023 challenge are:

- 27<sup>th</sup> February 2023 challenge opens for student entries
- Friday 18th August 2023 challenge closes for student entries
- Friday 1st September 2023 final date for coordinator validations of completed reading records.

Students in Years K-2 are busy ticking off 30 books together with their classes and teachers; while students in Years 3-6 are working hard to independently read 20 books and log them in the PRC portal.

All classes and students have until 11th August to complete the challenge.

As long as books are from the reading list applicable to their age, or older, Years 3-6 students may:

- Read and log books borrowed from a different library.
- Listen to an audiobook or e-book format.


### Parent Teacher Interviews

# **English**


English had a fun filled close of Term 2 and are looking forward to more learning in Term 3.

This term students in Year 8 will be exploring the film Inside Out and creating a website.




Their teachers are excited to see how students express themselves with technology.

Year 9 are studying the novel Miss Peregrine's Home for Peculiar Children and learning all about coming-of-age fantasy novels.




Students will develop their writing skills and compose an imaginative piece.








We participated in an informative session with Zoo staff where we got to interact with some different animals (including Peril the Tortoise and Minh the Python) and learn about their adaptations.

# Cicada x Tech23

On 26<sup>th</sup> July, four senior students were lucky enough to be able to attend Cicada x Tech23.

This was a professional conference held just across the road from APCS, where 23 of the best new science and technology start-ups are invited to share their ideas with other scientists, governments, and investors.

Throughout the day we heard keynote speakers, interviews, and panels on topics such as time dilation and quantum computing, and a special mollusc known by the Cabrogal people as a powerful medicine.







Some of the technologies that we learnt about included a plastic product replacement grown by bacteria, a thunderstorm machine that helps mushrooms grow faster, and a nanoparticle gold toothpaste that protects from gum disease.



# **NAIDOC Maths Activity 2023**

For this year's NAIDOC Day activities the Mathematics Faculty focused on the topic of Aboriginal Astronomy.

Through a series of discussions around three videos, students learned about how deep and farreaching Aboriginal astronomy is.

This included how the twinkling of stars (e.g. colour, fuzziness and speed of twinkling) can inform about weather, the changing of seasons, incoming rains and when to plant crops.

The students also learned about the Wurda-Youang Stone arrangement, possibly the world's oldest known astronomical site, which likely was used to mark key parts of the year.

All groups were engaged and took away some valuable experiences from the workshop.




You can borrow below CBC shortlisted books from the Yakka Taka. The CBC judges will announce the winners during book week.
