We would like to acknowledge and pay respect to the Cadigal people of the Eora nation, the traditional owners of the land on which we teach and learn. In Gomberee, the language of the Cadigal people, the word Yarramundi (yarra'-mu-ndi) means flowing mouth which is an analogy for story telling or a story teller. We name our newsletter Yarramundi as it tells the stories of Alex Park as we progress through each school year. Yarramundi also means amphitheater or a place where stories are told. This is why we have named the gathering space in the primary playground Yarramundi.

Principal's Report

We have had a productive start to the new year and looking forward to many great events and initiatives in the coming year.



This year we have 590 Primary School enrolments (including PSU) and 714 in High School. We welcomed 68 new Kindergarten students. 150 Year 7 students, 30 OC students in Year 5 and 40 new enrolments across High School and Primary. We are also proud to have opened our HS Support Unit with two full classes of students. We are continuing to enrol students from Central Sydney intensive English Centre each term and will hold a transition week later in the term.

CELEBRATING THE HSC 2024

In the 2024 HSC cohort

APCS had the following achievements:

- 71 students who sat for the HSC
- 41 students received ATAR and all 41 were offered university entry

NAPLAN has started for Years in 3, 5,7 &9. While this is a one off, the assessment does provide us with useful data in terms of our student progress. It also allows for intervention including extension of our high achieving students.

relationship with Carriageworks and Solid Ground 2025 initiative. This year the artist is Akala Newman and is working with our Year 7 students facilitating workshops throughout this term. Our newly appointed Music Teacher Mr Schuel is coordinating this program with Aunty Deb our Aboriginal Engagement Officer.

This year our cover for our Yarramundi Newsletter is inspired by an artwork created in collaboration with our elder, Uncle Bruce Shillingsworth working with myself, Aunty Deb and our school community to design a painting that represents Alexandria Park Community School. The artwork features Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander designs. Uncle Bruce designed a personalised cultural artwork to honor and represent the Gadigal land on which Alexandria Park Community School stands. The design incorporates our school colors, reflecting the rich history of the four schools that have united to become the community we are todav.

Thank you to our Year 7-12 families who have expressed interest in purchasing our new Hoodie uniform. We are hoping to have this item available for the cooler months.

Thank you for supporting our school to continue to be such a wonderful place to work and learn. Alexandria Park Community School strives for excellence in its educational and wellbeing programs for both our students and staff.

ENHANCING LEARNING WITH MATHSPACE

The Mathematics Faculty has introduced Mathspace. an innovative online learning platform designed to support students in developing their mathematical understanding. Mathspace combines an **AI-powered** chatbot. a comprehensive online textbook, and an interactive system of hints and video examples, all in one place. This platform enables students to receive immediate feedback, refine their problem-solving skills, and engage with mathematics in a dynamic and supportive environment. Students are encouraged to make full use of this resource to enhance their learning both in and outside the classroom. Mathspace classroom links should be available via Google Classroom. Students must ensure that they are logged into their DET portal before creating their accounts or logging in.

THE IMPORTANCE OF SCIENTIFIC CALCULATORS

Students are reminded of the importance of bringing a scientific calculator to every Mathematics lesson. A calculator is an essential tool that supports students in their problemsolving and reinforces numerical fluency. Having one readily available will ensure students can participate fully in lessons and prepare effectively for assessments. The CASIO FX-82AU is recommended for most students with the CASIO FX-8200AU being recommended for senior students studying the more academically rigorous advanced and extension courses.




UPCOMING ASSESSMENTS

English

Our learners in English and English as an Additional Language or Dialect (EAL/D) are off to a flying start.

Year 7 are reading Liar's Test, a fabulous new fantasy adventure by Amberlin Kwaymullina, a First Nations author from the Palyku people of the Pilbara in WA.

Year 8 are delving into poetry in all its forms. Just ask them to tell you the difference between a simile and a metaphor, or alliteration and onomatopoeia.

Year 9 are creating advertising campaigns and pitches and, although APCS isn't Gruen, some are just as nervous about presenting live as the entrants in The Shark Tank. Year 10 are writing persuasive speeches on a topic that resonates with their personal sense of culture, identity and individuality (see above for nerves!)

Year 11 and 12 are gearing up for the Big One, practising sophisticated analysis of a range of genres and writing their own creative and discursive pieces. While some of the texts they study may focus on imaginative works, they do plenty of "real life" speaking and writing too, and the skills they learn are transferrable to all other subjects, as well as the wider world.

Science

Year 11 Earth and Environmental Science Field Trip.

With a growing number of APCS students expressing their interest in the sciences, this year the Science Faculty has introduced a new course for our Year 11 students. Lead by our newest staff member, Ms Franks, students from the Year 11 Earth and Environmental Science class embarked on a field trip to Bundeena earlier this term. Staff and students took the train and ferry down to Bundeena for a day of field work.

They started off the day by examining water

management strategies in Bundeena and undertaking water quality tests. The group then continued on for a short walk to Jibbon Beach, looking at invasive plant spread as well as examples of historical Aboriginal shell middens and ancient rock carvings of local animals at Jibbon Headland.

It was a fantastic day for students to apply their knowledge to the real-world and explore how science is conducted outside the classroom.


SCHOOL HOLIDAY SUCCESS


